A RESOLUTION

APIL Resolution No. 32-GA-08, CD1

"Calling on Pacific Island nations to support the creation of a Pacific Islands Regional Shark Sanctuary and opposing the United States' National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration proposal to undermine the progress in shark conservation made by Pacific Island jurisdictions."

1	WHEREAS, Pacific people afford special respect to sharks, using them in our stories,
2	myths, songs, and art; and
3	WHEREAS, healthy shark populations maintain the balance in the ecosystems that
4	support many other species, build resiliency against climate change by keeping habitats like coral
5	reefs healthy, and ultimately affect the fish populations that we depend on for food; and
6	WHEREAS, the latest and best science estimates that 100 million sharks are killed each
7	year; and
8	WHEREAS, shark populations cannot sustain current rates of overfishing and unlike
9	other fish species are slow growing and produce few young like whales and dolphins, and thus
10	more than 140 unique species are threatened by overfishing; and
11	WHEREAS, each entity within this Association and the Pacific shares the same ocean
12	water resources and ecosystems that are affected by the overfishing of sharks; and
13	WHEREAS, member legislative assemblies of the APIL should consider the use of
14	sharks for perpetuating cultural practices to be allowable; and
15	WHEREAS, the people of the Pacific have led the world in taking decisive action to
16	create shark protections and enforcing them; and

1	WHEREAS, the Association of Pacific Island Legislatures, during its 30 th General
2	Assembly in the Republic of Palau adopted resolution No. 30-GA-03 on June 17, 2011,
3	requesting all legislative assemblies of the APIL to adopt legislation prohibiting the possession,
4	selling, offering for sale, trading or distribution of shark fins, and ray parts, which underscores
5	the APIL's recognition of the importance of sharks and their relationship to the health of the
6	Pacific Ocean; and
7	WHEREAS, the presidents and governors at the 15th Micronesia Chief Executive
8	Summit agreed to create a Micronesia Regional Shark Sanctuary encompassing the waters of the
9	Republic of the Marshall Islands, Federated States of Micronesia, Republic of Palau,
10	Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, and Guam; and
11	WHEREAS, led by Palau in 2009, Marshall Islands, American Samoa, Kosrae, Pohnpei,
12	Yap, Tokelau, French Polynesia, Cook Islands, New Caledonia, Maldives, Honduras, and The
13	Bahamas have created shark sanctuaries by fully protecting all shark species; and
14	WHEREAS, Chuuk State Legislature's House of Representatives passed Chuuk's shark
15	conservation and protection bill and is now in the senate for approval and APIL encourages the
16	senate to pass this important shark protection bill; and
17	WHEREAS, led by Hawaii in 2010, Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands,
18	Guam, Washington, Oregon, California, Illinois, Maryland and Delaware have banned the sale,
19	trade, and possession of shark fins; and
20	WHEREAS, a proposal by the United States' National Oceanic and Atmospheric
21	Administration to overturn shark fin trade bans in the states and territories undermines the
22	progress in shark conservation in the Pacific Island nations that has been made over the past few
23	years and goes against the overwhelming public support for strong shark protections; and
24	WHEREAS, the statutes enacted within the U.S. states and territories are an exercise of
25	traditional state police powers over the sale of products that establish by law the legitimate state
26	interests of ensuring a sustainable ocean and planet by addressing the conservation of natural
27	resources and the protection of public health; and
28	WHEREAS, U.S. states and territory laws on shark protection do not directly conflict
29	with federal law that primarily regulates shark finning and the taking of sharks within the U.S.
30	waters, rather these laws prohibit the sale, trade, or possession of shark fins in state and territorial
31	jurisdictions; now, therefore,

1	BE IT RESOLVED by the Association of Pacific Island Legislatures, 32 nd General
2	Assembly, Honolulu, Hawaii, June 25-27, 2013, that APIL hereby declares that it is in agreement
3	with the perceptive enactments of protective legislation for sharks across the globe and requests
4	that all Pacific Island nations end the unsustainable commercial fishing of sharks by enacting a
5	Pacific Islands Regional Shark Sanctuary; and
6	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that governments implementing shark protections,
7	including, but not limited to the Republic of Palau, Republic of the Marshall Islands, American
8	Samoa, Kosrae, Pohnpei, Yap, Tokelau, French Polynesia, Cook Islands, New Caledonia,
9	Hawaii, Northern Mariana Islands, and concerned non-governmental organizations and island
10	communities, collaborate on best practices for policy development, enforcement, research,
11	outreach, and education; and
12	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the APIL recognizes conservation values of the
13	U.S. state and territories statutes that strengthen the U.S. leadership in global shark conservation;
14	and
15	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the APIL hereby declares its opposition to the
16	United States' National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's proposal to undermine the
17	progress in shark conservation made by Pacific Island jurisdictions; and
18	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the APIL President shall certify, and the APIL
19	Secretary shall attest to the adoption hereof and that copies of the same shall be transmitted to
20	the Pacific Islands Forum Secretariat, Federated States of Micronesia President Manny Mori;
21	United States President Barack Obama, the United States' National Oceanic and Atmospheric
22	Administration and to the Chief Executives and Legislative Presiding Officers of each member
23	jurisdiction of the Association of the Pacific Island Legislatures.
