A RESOLUTION

APIL Resolution No. 37-GA-05

"Commending the efforts of Ms. Yolanda Joab for her tireless efforts, both here and abroad, to address the needs of those who are most vulnerable to the damaging effects of climate change through programs that are changing attitudes about the sources and effects of climate change, and through projects directly designed for climate change adaptation and mitigation."

1	WHEREAS, climate change in Micronesia is real, and its damaging effects
2	are becoming ever more noticeable; and
3	WHEREAS, elder Micronesian statesmen such as the late Honorable Tony
4	A. deBrum have brought the fear and suffering of the Micronesian island peoples to
5	the forefront of international attention, but as the destiny of Micronesia is delivered
6	into the hands of younger generations of Micronesians as we begin to actually
7	confront the realities of climate change, what will become of our islands and our
8	ways of life; and
9	WHEREAS, the Association of Pacific Island Legislatures is proud to say
10	that the fate of our islands and of our people is already passing into capable hands,
11	and some of those capable hands belong to the women of our societies; and
12	WHEREAS, the Fifty-fifth Board of Directors meeting of this Association
13	gave recognition to the work of Marshallese poet Kathy Jetnil-Kijiner who in 2014
14	took center stage at the U.N. Climate Leaders Summit in New York where she
15	recited a poem of her own authorship telling the tale of her experiences with climate
16	change on her home atoll and of over-coming the threats of climate change for the
17	future of her baby daughter; and

1	WHEREAS, while Ms. Jetnil-Kijiner was rallying the pundits of climate
2	change in New York City, Ms. Yolanda Joab of Pohnpei State was just as vocally
3	and forcefully carrying the message of climate change to the most basic and
4	fundamental levels of Micronesian society, the schools and community centers of our
5	islands; and
6	WHEREAS, commencing in 2011, Ms. Yolanda Joab took on a leading role
7	in running one of IOM's flagship programs, the "Climate Change Adaptation,
8	Disaster Risk Reduction and Education Program, (CADRE)"; and
9	WHEREAS, when Ms. Yolanda Joab began this program seven years ago,
10	there was very little knowledge at the community level of just what global warming
11	was all about and how it was affecting the islands of Micronesia; and
12	WHEREAS, from the initiation of a pilot project involving just six schools in
13	2011, the program has now grown to involve more than 50 schools and numerous
14	communities across the vast expanses of Micronesia, with the training of over 300
15	teachers in the fields of climate change, adaptation and mitigation who in turn have
16	educated over 10,000 students in mechanisms to cope with climate change and to
17	prepare for natural emergencies and disasters; and
18	WHEREAS, the efforts of Ms. Yolanda Joab and her fellow team members
19	have not been limited to just preaching and teaching about climate change, but they
20	are also engaging in real time projects to build seawalls, erect potable water tanks
21	and install solar panel systems, all designed to adapt to climate change and hardened
22	island infrastructures to survive natural disasters; and

1	WHEREAS, as her reputation in administering and promoting the Climate
2	Change Adaptation, Disaster Risk Reduction and Education Program in Micronesia
3	grew, climate change experts from abroad began to request Ms. Yolanda Joab to
4	address larger and larger international audiences on her work in Micronesia and her
5	dedication to combating the damaging effects of climate change, not only here in the
6	APIL Pacific, but also in other vulnerable parts of the world; and
7	WHEREAS, in 2016, Ms. Yolanda Joab was a Guest Youth Speaker at the
8	IUCN World Conservation Congress in Honolulu, Hawaii and a Delegate Speaker at
9	the One World Summit in Ottowa, Canada; and
10	WHEREAS, in 2017, Ms. Yolanda Joab was invited as an International
11	Guest Speaker at the German Green Party Convention in Berlin, Germany and an
12	International Guest Speaker at the World Forum on Natural Capital in Edinburgh,
13	Scotland; and
14	WHEREAS, with the strength of her voice, the compassionate nature of her
15	delivery, and the urgent content of her message, it is the sense of the Association of
16	Pacific Island Legislatures that the presence of Ms. Yolanda Joab and her story of
17	how she has taken the message of climate change into the very homes and villages of
18	the island peoples who are being most affected by climate change will continue to
19	reverberate for many years to come, both within the local communities of Micronesia
20	and at important climate change events around the world; now, therefore,

1 **BE IT RESOLVED** by the Association of Pacific Island Legislatures, 37th 2 General Assembly, FSM State of Pohnpei, June 26-29, 2018, that the Association of 3 Pacific Island Legislature hereby sincerely commends the efforts of Ms. Yolanda 4 Joab for her tireless efforts, both here and abroad, to address the needs of those who 5 are most vulnerable to the damaging effects of climate change through programs that 6 are changing attitudes about the sources and effects of climate change, and through 7 projects directly designed for climate change adaptation and mitigation; and 8 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the APIL President shall certify and the 9 APIL Secretary shall attest to the adoption hereof, and that copies of the same shall 10 be thereafter transmitted to Ms. Yolanda Joab, to the Chief of Mission of IOM for the 11 FSM, and to the Chief Executives and Presiding Legislative Officers of the member 12 jurisdictions of the Association of Pacific Island Legislatures.
