## **A RESOLUTION**

Resolution No. 59-BOD-03

"Calling upon and urging the United States to uphold its commitment towards the Decolonization and Self Determination of Guam."

**WHEREAS**, when the United Nations was established in 1945, there were a total of seventy-two colonies on the United Nations list of Non-Self-Governing Territories slated for decolonization and the corresponding institution of self-government; and

**WHEREAS**, at the time the United Nations was brought into being, approximately 750 million people, constituting almost one-third of the world's population, lived in lands that were non-self-governing and dependent upon the administration of colonial powers; but

**WHEREAS**, today, fewer than 2 million people live in a state of existence without self-government; and

WHEREAS, thankfully, in the years that have passed since the founding of the United Nations, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, the Federated States of Micronesia, the Republic of the Marshall Islands and the Republic of Palau, as well as the island nations of the Republic of Nauru and the Republic of Kiribati, all former colonies in the Micronesian region of the Pacific Ocean, have all exercised various modes of self-determination carried out in accordance with the uniquely expressed wishes and desires of their own peoples; however

WHEREAS, the Association of Pacific Island Legislatures, acting through its Board of Directors, hereby expresses our deep concern that nearly sixty years after the adoption of the U.N. Declaration on the Granting of Independence to Colonial Countries and Peoples in 1960, there still remain seventeen Non-Self-Governing Territories that have not yet been given the opportunity to exercise their right to self-determination; moreover

1 WHEREAS, an essential member jurisdiction of the Association of Pacific Island Legislatures, the Island of Guam, remains a Non-Self-Governing Territory within the 2 meaning of the United Nations Charter, with the United States of America being its 3 Administering Power; and 4 5 WHEREAS, the Association of Pacific Island Legislatures reaffirms its stand in solidarity with the people of Guam who are entitled to their right of self-determination; 6 and 7 WHEREAS, decolonization necessarily involves a plebiscite by the Native 8 9 Inhabitants of Guam as defined by the Guam Decolonization Registry Law; and 10 WHEREAS, the planned decolonization vote should be held forthwith and not 11 obstructed by the Government of the United States; and WHEREAS, the United States should be conscious of the importance of its role 12 in continuing the effective implementation of the Declaration on the Granting of 13 Independence to Colonial Countries and Peoples and the target set by the United Nations 14 to eradicate colonialism by 2020, as well as the plans of action for the Second and Third 15 International Decades for the Eradication of Colonialism; now, therefore, 16 **BE IT RESOLVED** by the Board of Directors of the Association of 17 Pacific Island Legislatures, 59<sup>th</sup> Board Meeting, January 30 to February 2, 2019, FSM 18 State of Yap, that the Board of Directors, on behalf of the Association of Pacific Island 19 Legislatures, hereby calls upon and urges the United States to comply with the United 20 Nations Charter, particularly its obligations under Article 73e of the same, the 21 Declaration on the Granting of Independence to Colonial Countries and Peoples, and any 22 and all other international conventions as well as custom relative to its international 23 24 obligations respecting the decolonization of Guam; and **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** by the Board of Directors of the Association of 25 26 Pacific Island Legislatures, that it hereby requests the United States to take any and all steps to enlist and make effective use of all possible assistance, on both a bilateral and a 27 28 multilateral basis, to achieve the decolonization of Guam; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Board of Directors of the Association of
Pacific Island Legislatures that it hereby supports the right of self-determination of the
Native Inhabitants of Guam, as defined by the Guam Decolonization Registry Law, the
full and speedy implementation of said law and the resultant decolonization of Guam;
and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that APIL President shall certify and the APIL 6 7 Secretary shall attest to the adoption hereof and that copies of the same shall be transmitted to the President of the United States of America, to the President of the 8 9 United States Senate, to the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, to the Guam Delegate to the United States House of Representatives, to the I Maga'hågan 10 11 Guåhan (Governor of Guam), to the Speaker of the I Liheslaturan Guåhan (Guam Legislature), and to the Chief Executives and Presiding Legislative Officers of the 12 member jurisdictions of the Association of Pacific Island Legislatures. 13
